Today, 30 April, is the Third Sunday of Easter (Year A).

Church Cleaning:

Monday 1 May: St Joseph the Worker

The Feast of St Joseph the Worker was established by Pope Pius XII in 1955 in order to Christianize the concept of work and give to all working men and women a model and a protector.

Tuesday 2 May: St Athanasius (295-373), Doctor of the Church

Born in Alexandria, Athanasius became its archbishop. At the Council of Nicea (325), which formulated the Creed we profess at Mass, he championed the faith against the Arian heresy which attacked the divinity of Christ. He suffered persecution and was exiled for seventeen years for resisting compromise in essentials of the faith.

Wednesday 3 May: Feast of St Philip & St James, Apostles

Philip was born at Bethsaida. Formerly a disciple of John the Baptist, he became a follower of Christ. James, the son of Alphaeus and a cousin of the Lord, ruled the church at Jerusalem, wrote the Epistle, and led a life of penance. He converted many, and was martyred in the year 62.

Thursday 4 May: English & Welsh Martyrs

During the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries, innumerable men and women from England and Wales suffered persecution for the faith. Many gave their lives for the supremacy of the Pope, the unity of the Church and the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. Of these martyrs, forty-two have now been canonised. Some one hundred and sixty others have been declared Blessed, and their common celebration is kept today.

Friday 5 May: Holy Rosary & First Friday Mass

On Fridays at 7pm the Holy Rosary is recited in the church. This Friday, the first Friday of the month, we also celebrate Mass at 7.30pm in honour of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, followed by prayers and anointing for healing.

Looking further ahead:

Next Sunday, 7 May: In honour of Mary

The month of May, which begins this week, is a fitting time to begin to recite the Rosary daily, says Pope Francis.

Next Sunday, at 3pm in the church, you are invited to attend devotions to Our Lady, Rosary, and Eucharistic adoration under the gaze of the Virgin Mary. And how does she look at us? She looks at us as a mother, with tenderness, mercy and love. That was how she gazed at her son Jesus at all the moments of his life—joyous, luminous, sorrowful, glorious—as we contemplate in the mysteries of the Holy Rosary, simply and lovingly.

Catholics in hospital are unlikely to receive an automatic visit from the Catholic Chaplain. If someone is taken to hospital, please let the Friary know or ask the staff on the ward to contact the Catholic Chaplain so that the patient may receive Holy Communion and/or the Sacrament of the Sick.

Holy Communion for the Housebound

Often, as we get older, we are not always able to attend Mass and need to receive the Sacrament at home. The priest or a eucharistic minister normally takes Holy Communion to the housebound at times when it is convenient. Please let Fr Gordon know if you or a loved one cannot attend Mass, and he will arrange Holy Communion at home.
