The Good News

Jesus taught with authority, proclaiming that the reign of God is at hand—urging us to repent and believe his message.

Jesus came to bring good news. When he was born it was announced as 'tidings of great joy'. After his resurrection, those who wrote about him, about his life, death and resurrection, called it *gospel*, 'Good News'.

What is this good news that Jesus brings? What is this reign of God that he says is at hand? It is a promise of love, a promise of forgiveness, of healing, of new life. Jesus came to bring the love of the Father to his children on earth. Jesus showed this love in all his works, in his healings, his forgiveness, his compassion for the crowds.

Jesus tells us again and again: 'Reform your lives and believe in the Good News.'

Wednesday 31 January: St John Bosco

Born 1815 in the diocese of Turin and brought up in poverty, he was ordained in 1841. He founded the Salesian Society of St Francis de Sales. He encouraged and educated deprived young boys in various trades. The order spread throughout the world, establishing schools, hospitals, and missions. With the help of Mary Mozzarella he established the Daughters of Mary, Help of Christians, to do similar work with girls.

Friday 2 February: The Presentation of the Lord

Forty days after the celebration of the birth of Jesus, the Church remembers his presentation in the Temple. Today's feast used to close the Christmas cycle. Although that season now ends with the Baptism of the Lord, today's feast is still calculated from Christmas Day. Formerly called the Purification of Our Lady and regarded as a Marian feast, the day is now regarded as a feast of Christ. We recall Jesus' entry into the Temple, a place this descendant of David calls home.

Also on Friday: Rosary followed by First Friday Mass

There will be an evening Mass at 7.30pm—with prayers and anointing for healing—after the usual recitation of the Holy Rosary at 7pm. All are welcome.

Saturday 3 February: St Blaise, Bishop & Martyr

The blessing of throats as a memorial of St Blaise is a time-honoured tradition. The rite calls for the blessing to be given with two candles that are crossed. Many follow the tradition whereby the candles are tied with red ribbon honouring his martyrdom.

St Blaise was a bishop in fourth-century Armenia and was viciously martyred under the Emperor Diocletian. It is said that while he was imprisoned for his faith he saved a child who was choking on a fish bone. His memorial highlights his role as patron of those who suffer from ailments of the throat.

When we approach the God of Mercy in the Sacrament of Reconciliation with sincerity and faith, we have nothing to lose and everything to gain: our sins are forgiven; our souls are restored to the state of grace; we receive the grace of the sacrament, which strengthens us to avoid sin in the future and restores the merits of our good works if they have been lost by sin; we receive the help to lead better lives.

Use the Sacrament of Reconciliation often and well!

Pack your bags.

Many people claim they don't 'get anything out of' Mass, but maybe this is because they fail to bring anything to it. God wants us to bring our issues, stresses, anxieties, fears and concerns—our personal 'baggage'—with us to Mass. So check your 'bags' at the altar. Bring a special intention with you, someone or something you want to offer up to the Lord upon the altar alongside the gifts. Remember that at Mass Jesus offers up his very self for you. Are you willing to offer up to him those things that may keep you from following and loving him more perfectly?

Daily Mass

'Every day [Jesus] humbles himself just as he did when he came from his heavenly throne into the Virgin's womb; every day he comes to us and lets us see him in lowliness, when he descends from the bosom of the Father into the hands of the priest at the altar.' (St Francis of Assisi)

Morning Mass is celebrated on every weekday (Monday–Friday at 7.30am & Saturday at 8am) in the Friary Chapel. For morning Mass, please enter via the main door of the Friary at 182 Iffley Road. Once in the porch, follow the sign to the Chapel.
