The Trials of Job

No one in the Bible experiences despair as much as Job. Job lost his livestock, his servants, his children and their homes through the forces of nature and enemy troops. He lost everything that was dear to him.

He realizes that what he has belongs to God. "The Lord gave and the Lord has taken away. Blessed be the name of the Lord."

As the reality of his loss sinks in, Job expresses despair. "My days come to an end without hope. I shall not see happiness again."

When we experience those emotions we may feel far from God. The security we once felt in God's presence departs.

But Job's raw emotions appear uncensored in the Bible and in today's readings. All human experience finds its place under the mantle of God's foreseeing care.



1st Reading: Job 7:1-4,6-7

Response: **Praise the Lord who heals the broken-hearted.**

2nd Reading: 1 Corinthians 9:16-19,22-23

Gospel: Mark 1:29-39

Entrance Antiphon: O come, let us worship God and bow low before the God who made us, for he is the Lord our God.

Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia! I am the light of the world, says the Lord; anyone who follows me will have the light of life. Alleluia!

Communion Antiphon: Let them thank the Lord for his mercy, his wonders for the children of men, for he satisfies the thirsty soul, and the hungry he fills with good things.

Sunday 4 February 2018: 5th Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year B)

Today is the Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year B).

This week:

Monday 5 February: St Agatha, Virgin & Martyr

St Agatha, one of the earliest Christian martyrs, died during the persecution of Decius. The tortures included the removal of her breasts, and she is now patron of women with breast cancer and other diseases of the breast. Her name is remembered among the women martyrs in the First Eucharistic Prayer.

Tuesday 6 February: St Paul Miki & Companions, Martyrs

Caught up in the midst of political machinations and fear of national conquest, Paul Miki and 25 companions, of whom some were altar servers, were tortured and finally crucified at Nagasaki in 1597. Celebrating this memorial of the martyrs from Japan reminds Catholics in other places of the global witness to the faith.

Wednesday 7 February: St Colette of Corbie, Poor Clare

Colette was born in France in 1381. After the death of her parents she distributed her wealth to the poor and, taking the habit of the Third Order, lived for some time as a recluse. She later entered the Poor Clares. She was responsible for renewing many of the Communities through her insistence on prayer and poverty. She died in 1447.

Friday 9 February: Holy Rosary

Every Friday evening at 7pm the Holy Rosary is recited in the church. All are welcome.

Saturday 10 February: St Scholastica

Born at Nursia in Umbria in the late fifth century, the sister of St Benedict, she consecrated herself to God in early childhood and dedicated her life to prayer and work. She is the patron of Benedictine nuns.

Looking ahead:

Next Sunday, 11 February: World Day of Prayer for the Sick

St Pope John Paul II initiated the day in 1992 to encourage people to pray for those who suffer from illness and for their caregivers. He had himself been diagnosed with Parkinson's a year before, and perhaps his own illness provided impetus for the designation of this day. 11 February is also the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes.

To celebrate the Day of Prayer for the Sick, I invite the parish community to attend a Holy Hour and Benediction at 3pm next Sunday, 11 February, during which we shall celebrate the Sacrament of the Sick.

It is almost the Season of Lent.

Lent is a time for spiritual renewal. For many people summer is the time for physical renewal, and Christmas the time to renew friendship and family relationships. In Lent we renew our spirit. We recommit ourselves to life in Christ. It is a season of prayer, fasting and almsgiving, to arrive at Easter purified of heart and renewed in spirit.

Lent starts with *Ash Wednesday*, 14 February.
